The Foundation distributed \$4.8 million to nonprofit organizations and community-led initiatives in the four core focus areas of Basic Human Needs, Economic Opportunity, Education, and Leadership & Equity.

As one of 11 members of the Close to Home Storytellers Network, Tiffany Christian shares her personal experiences to increase understanding of who is most at risk of homelessness in Metro Denver: women and children. In 2017, the Storytellers spoke to more than 1,500 people across Metro Denver, most of whom said the stories motivated them to get involved with the issue. Since 2015, nearly 1,000 organizations and individuals have formally pledged to support Close to Home and advance its message in their communities.







#### **SHINING A LIGHT:**

#### **COMMON SENSE DISCIPLINE**

In 2017, more than 15 schools in Metro
Denver and Aurora implemented Common
Sense Discipline, a holistic approach
to supporting student engagement and
success. Common Sense Discipline practices
emphasize work with students transitioning
from fifth to sixth grade, like these girls
at Park Lane Elementary in Aurora, and
from eighth to ninth grade. Through
Common Sense Discipline, teachers and
administrators learn to evaluate the role of
racial bias in their teaching, and to reframe
everything that a student brings to school
as an asset that can be used to promote
learning.



Our grants build on neighborhoods' existing assets, such as schools, non-profits, and people, and equip residents with skills, networks, and resources to identify and implement solutions to local challenges.



Every year, our scholarship programs help hundreds of people build a better future by unlocking opportunities to learn, grow, and discover their potential. Supported by generous individuals, families, institutions, and businesses, these scholarships provide hope and resources to high school and college students as well as educators, professionals, and others.

#### **SHINING A LIGHT:**

#### **FAILURE AWARDS**

Created in partnership with The Denver Foundation, the Museum of Contemporary Art Denver's Failure Awards Scholarship encourages Colorado high school seniors to risk artistic failure in pursuit of something new. The fund awards up to six finalists each year with scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$10,000. In 2017, Anise Aiello, second from right, took the top prize with an embellished, 1930s-style swing jacket inspired by feminism and women's health advocacy.



populations across the state. Partners in the Fund serve people in their communities, meet the unique needs of vulnerable people and meet their unique needs, and bridge the geographic gaps that sometimes put care out of reach. In its second year of funding, which concluded in August 2017, the Colorado Health Access Fund provided resources and support to 36 community healthcare partners across Colorado, including 15 new partners.

#### **SHINING A LIGHT:**

#### **WEST SPRINGS HOSPITAL**

In September 2017, The Denver Foundation was on hand to break ground on the expansion of the West Springs Hospital in Grand Junction, which was funded in part by a \$2 million grant from the Colorado Health Access Fund. The state-of-the art addition doubled the space and bed count of the hospital, which for years has been the only psychiatric facility between Denver and Salt Lake City. West Springs serves people from Grand Junction, Mesa County, and other rural and mountain communities.





# **IMPACT INVESTING**


Through co-investment, The Denver Foundation collaborates with donors, community leaders, local institutions, and public and private partners to amplify our impact and address challenges that people in Metro Denver face. Working alongside donors and other partners, we mobilizes philanthropic capital to invest in programs with strong social, and in some cases financial, returns.

#### **2017 CO-INVESTMENT ACTIVITIES**

The Greenline Small Business Capital Fund is a national fund that invests in small businesses that are located in economically distressed communities and are strong employers of people with lower incomes and people of color. The goal is to preserve or create jobs with good wages, career mobility, and benefits. In 2017, The Greenline Small Business Capital Fund garnered support from both the Foundation's Impact Investment Fund, which invested just over \$200,000, and donor-advised fundholders, who invested more than \$2.2 million. The Denver Foundation's investments in the Fund focus on job preservation and creation in the Metro Denver region, in alignment with our Economic Opportunity programs and grantmaking.

Hands of the Carpenter is a nonprofit social enterprise that provides single moms with cars and car repair services that are critical to their education and employment. The Denver Foundation coordinated an impact investment for Social Venture Partners Denver and invested \$37,500 from its Impact Investing Fund to help the organization buy a garage for its core work. Members of Social Venture Partners Denver provided an additional \$110,000 in funding for a low-interest loan.




