Conservation Colorado Education Fund, to continue the work of the Protége program, which builds on the strong Latino cultural commitment to conservation values and seeks to elevate Latino voices and empower communities to engage to defend their right to a healthy environment. The program supported by the EAG will do leadership training for community members interested in environmental justice in Durango and in metro Denver. Latinos' voices are not well represented when decisions are made about environmental concerns. This program aims to correct that under-representation, and to infuse Colorado's environmental movement with more inclusive values. conservationco.org/protegete/
