A message from the president

2024 was a year of profound transition, with a growing sense of fragmentation, socially, technologically, and politically. While we felt these shifts deeply here in Colorado, we also saw our community show up for each other with creativity, care, and commitment.

In 2024, we launched a new initiative to bring people together across lines of difference: Belonging Colorado, a special fund at The Denver Foundation. We awarded \$225,000 to support 15 organizations, representing nonprofits, community-based organizations, and local governments, to help plan their programs to expand Coloradans' sense of belonging. They will implement these plans in 2025 and 2026.

We are proud to be a part of this initiative, and it's only a piece of all the incredible work carried out by our donors, fundholders, nonprofit partners, and community members in 2024.

Together, we invested \$134 million in this community, including \$5.5 million through our endowment, the Fund for Denver, to 427 organizations in Metro Denver. Our fundholders awarded \$99 million to causes ranging from religious institutions to climate groups, and the arts. And more students than ever received support to pursue their education, with 2024 marking our largest year yet in both the number of scholarships awarded and the total dollars distributed.

What we accomplished together in 2024 is a reminder of what's possible. In a year of uncertainty, people came together, investing in connection, opportunity, and a more sustainable and inclusive future. Now more than ever, these values will continue to guide our work.



Makes grants to support work by community-led groups from communities of color and communities with lower incomes.








